## **UPCOMING EVENTS**

The people of Ukraine need your help. As the war continues in Ukraine, millions of the country's inhabitants are in dire straits often lacking the basic necessities of life. As part of your personal sacrifice, kindly consider making a donation towards providing emergency services and humanitarian and pastoral support to Ukrainians by offering care, medical supplies, food, clothing and shelter to displaced persons, the elderly and the sick, as well as educational programs and support to local priests.

- A photocopy of the **Baptismal, Marriage and Death Registers** entries for the year 2023.

The **28<sup>th</sup> World Day for Consecrated Life** will be celebrated on **February 2**, the Feast of the Encounter (Presentation) of Our Lord in the Temple.

The World Day for Consecrated Life was instituted by Pope John Paul II in 1997, a day of prayer for those women and men who have devoted their lives to God in consecrated life.

This celebration is attached to the Feast of the Encounter (Presentation) of the Lord. On this Feast, candles are traditionally blessed symbolizing Christ who is the light of the world. So too, those in consecrated life are called to reflect light of Jesus Christ to all peoples.

On this day, we honour and celebrate those in consecrated life, in particular, the Sisters Servants of Mary Immaculate, the Order of Saint Basil the Great, and the Skete of the Exaltation of the Precious and Life-creating Cross.

Please pray for all those who have made commitments in consecrated life and be sure to thank them on their special day. May they continue to be inspired by Jesus Christ and respond generously to God's gift of their vocation.

**New?** The  $32^{nd}$  World Day of the Sick will be celebrated on February 11, the Memorial of the Blessed Virgin Mary of Lourdes (according to the Roman Catholic liturgical calendar). The annual World Day of the Sick is an opportunity to devote special attention to the sick and to those who provide them with assistance and care both in healthcare institutions and within families and communities.

In his annual World Day of the Sick Message, **Pope Francis** chose the theme: <u>"It is not good</u> that man should be alone—Healing the Sick by Healing Relationships." The Holy Father invites us to reflect on the fundamental importance of human relationships in the process of healing and comforting the sick.

The Office for Family and Life (Canadian Conference of Catholic Bishops) has compiled and developed a <u>Pastoral Toolkit - World Day of the Sick</u> to help promote World Day of the Sick 2024. The folder includes the CCCB press release, the Pope's message, a video, social media assets, a prayer card and pastoral suggestions for families and parishes.

**New?** Annual Clergy Study Days: September 9-12 (starting 2:00 pm Tuesday; ending 3:00 pm Thursday, Providence Renewal Centre. Deacon Daniel Galadza, Special Topics in Liturgy and the Ukrainian Catholic Church – Part II).

Pope Francis declared 2025 as a Jubilee Year designating its theme as "Pilgrims of Hope."

In the words of the Holy Father, "Pilgrims of Hope" evokes "the movement of a Church that walks in pilgrimage to the light of hope that makes the future possible.... The Jubilee, with its focus on conversion, forgiveness, abundance, walk, and mercy, becomes a possibility for the future itself.

"Hope is the light that brightens the future, but not in a naively optimistic sense. We know it: hope is Jesus Christ dead and risen.... "The people that walked in darkness have seen a great light; on the inhabitants of a country in shadow dark as death light has blazed forth.' (Isaiah 9:1). The light is that of the Son made Man, Jesus, who with the very Word, gathers every people and every nation.

"We must fan the flame of hope that has been given us, and help everyone to gain new strength and certainty by looking to the future with an open spirit, a trusting heart and far-sighted vision. The forthcoming Jubilee can contribute greatly to restoring a climate of hope and trust as a prelude to the renewal and rebirth that we so urgently desire; that is why I have chosen as the motto of the Jubilee, Pilgrims of Hope."

New! In January 2022, the Canadian Catholic Bishops of Canada announced the creation of an **Indigenous Reconciliation Fund** to support Indigenous-led projects in the areas of: Healing and Reconciliation for Communities and Families; Culture and Language Revitalization; Education and Community Building; and Dialogues for Promoting Indigenous Spirituality and Culture.

The Fund represents a Catholic Commitment to Healing and Reconciliation.

The **Eparchy of Edmonton was pleased to provide a \$10,000 grant** towards an <u>Indigenous</u> <u>Beadwork Project at Catholic Parish of Sacred Heart, Edmonton – Indigenous Reconciliation Fund</u> (<u>irfund.ca</u>). "The Indigenous Beadwork project is a transformative initiative that celebrates the art form of beading, holding deep cultural significance for Indigenous, Inuit, and Métis peoples. Guided by a resilient Dene woman who survived residential schools, these workshops focus on healing, using traditional materials, fostering connection and reviving cultural practices."

New The **Canadian Catholic Bishops of Canada**, through its Episcopal Commission for Justice and Peace, issued a **Pastoral Letter** on the use of social media titled: <u>Let Your Speech Always Be</u> <u>Gracious</u>.

The Pastoral Letter reflects upon the benefits and dangers of social media from the perspective of Catholic Social Teaching. It provides tools for moral reflection and self-examination, and suggests seven commitments by which to be guided for a more ethical use of social media:

- check for accuracy,
- seek greater perspective,
- value human dignity,
- bring curiosity into the conversation,
- distinguish between intention and impact, and
- privilege "in real life" encounters.

New The Eparchy of Edmonton launched a new liturgical app called <u>iPraises</u>, available in Android and Apple platforms. The app is free and hosts the liturgical propers in English for the Divine Liturgy each day during the year, including the troparion, kondak, Epistle, Gospel, and everything else you need to follow along during the Divine Liturgy. The app can also be used at home, school, or work to take a few moments in prayer with the Lord each day.
