

The Holy Martyrs Eutropius and His Companions Cleonicus and Basiliscus (286-305)



This whole week there are 8 (so far) students who are participating in our Lenten Icon Workshop here in our parish. Please pray for us as we learn about both painting and becoming the image of Christ.

The Great Fast

-an excerpt from Fr. Thomas Hopko's Book: The Orthodox Faith

The season of Great Lent is the time of preparation for the feast of the Resurrection of Christ. It is the living symbol of man's entire life which is to be fulfilled in his own resurrection from the dead with Christ. It is a time of renewed devotion: of prayer, fasting, and almsgiving. It is a time of repentance, a real renewal of our minds, hearts and deeds in conformity with Christ and his teachings. It is the time, most of all, of our return to the great commandments of loving God and our neighbours.

The Great Fast continued...

In the Church, Great Lent is not a season of morbidity and gloominess. On the contrary, it is a time of joyfulness and purification. We are called to "anoint our faces" and to "cleanse our bodies as we cleanse our souls." The very first hymns of the very first service of Great Lent set the proper tone of the season:

Let us begin the lenten time with delight ... let us fast from passions as we fast from food, taking pleasure in the good words of the Spirit, that we may be granted to see the holy passion of Christ our God and his holy Pascha, spiritually rejoicing. Thy grace has arisen upon us, O Lord, the illumination of our souls has shown forth; behold, now is the acceptable time; behold, now is the time of repentance (Vespers Hymns).

It is our repentance that God desires, not our remorse. We sorrow for our sins, but we do so in the joy of God's mercy. We mortify our flesh, but we do so in the joy of our resurrection into life everlasting. We make ready for the resurrection during Great Lent, both Christ's Resurrection and our own.

Saints of the Day: (text from the OCA website)

The Holy Martyrs Eutropius, Cleonicus and Basiliscus suffered in the city of Pontine Amasea (Asia Minor) in about the year 308.

The brothers Eutropius and Cleonicus, and Basiliscus the nephew of the Great Martyr Theodore the Recruit (February 17), were comrades. After the martyric death of Saint Theodore, they wound up in prison and by their preaching brought many of the pagans in prison with them to the Christian Faith.

When he tortured Saint Theodore, Publius perished shamefully, struck down by divine wrath. Asclepiodotus was chosen as ruler of Amasea, and was more inhumane than his predecessor. Knowing the comrades of Saint Theodore the Recruit were all in prison, the governor commanded that they be brought to him. Saints Eutropius, Cleonicus and Basiliscus thus firmly confessed their faith in Christ before this new governor. They were mercilessly beaten, so that their bodies were entirely bruised.

As he was being tortured Saint Eutropius prayed loudly to the Saviour, "Grant us, O Lord, to endure these wounds for the sake of the crown of martyrdom, and help us, as You helped Your servant Theodore." In answer to the saint's prayer, the Lord Himself appeared to the martyrs with His angels and the holy Great Martyr Theodore the Recruit, saying to them: "Behold, the Saviour has come to help you, that you may know life eternal."

Soldiers and many of the people standing nearby were also granted to behold the Saviour. They urged Asclepiodotus to halt the tortures. Seeing that the people were distraught and ready to believe in the true God, the governor commanded the martyrs to be taken away. The governor then invited Saint Eutropius to supper and urged him to offer public sacrifice to the pagan gods, yet remain a Christian in soul. Eutropius refused this offer.

On the following day they brought the martyrs to a pagan temple, to force them to offer sacrifice. Eutropius entreated the Saviour: "Lord, be with us, and destroy the raging of the pagans. Grant that on this place the Bloodless Sacrifice of the Christians be offered to You, the true God." No sooner had these last words been spoken, than an earthquake began. The walls of the temple collapsed, and

the statue of the goddess Artemis was smashed to bits. Everyone fled from the temple to avoid being crushed among the rubble. In the noise of the earthquake a voice was heard



from on high: "Your prayer has been heard, and on this place a house of Christian prayer shall be built."


When the earthquake ended, the governor Asclepiodotus, barely recovered from his fright, gave orders to drive high wooden stakes into the ground, tie the martyrs to them and pour boiling tar over them. The saints began to pray to God, and Eutropius cried out turning to the torturers: "May the Lord turn your deed against you!"

The tar began to flow beside the bodies of the martyrs, like water with marble, scorching the torturers. Those seeing this fled in terror, but the governor in his bitterness gave orders to rake their bodies with iron hooks and to sting their wounds with mustard mixed with salt and vinegar. The saints endured these torments with remarkable firmness.

The night before their execution the saints spent their time at prayer, and again the Lord appeared to them and strengthened them.

On the morning of March 3, Saints Eutropius and Cleonicus were crucified, but Basiliscus was left in prison.

Saint Basiliscus was executed on May 22 in the city of Komana. They beheaded him, and threw his body into a river, but Christians found his relics and buried them in a ploughed field. Later at Komana a church was built and dedicated to Saint Basiliscus.

Well it's official and it's booked. Our Lenten Mission will happen in slightly less than one month. On April 1, 2 & 3 Fr. Ephrem Kardouh, a Syrian born Catholic Priest will be joining us in prayer and reflection. Fr. Ephrem is currently the pastor of St. Basil's parish in Calgary. He is a beautiful soul. As both a priest and a monk



(hiero-monk) and as a father to hundreds of refugees who fled persecution in Syria he will give a profound mission for us. And... he is fun.

In addition to having such a loved guest, our parish has the EXTREME pleasure of hosting the travelling icon of Our Lady Help of Persecuted Christians. This is a large and beautiful replica of the original which


shows how our Mother indeed cares for and intercedes for the whole church, especially those who are under persecution. This icon is part of the Knights of Columbus' Marian Prayer Program.

Although in our Albertan Society we feel little bits of anti-Christian sentiment from time to time, and we suffer more from apathy then from outside pressure, we must realize that at this time more Christians are being persecuted and martyred than in any previous century. Of course we hear about the tragic beheadings and

murders of Christians in the Middle East and Africa, but we also know of many of the faithful who disappear in Eastern Europe (yes, especially in Ukraine), China, and throughout the world. These people NEED our prayers and support.



- Pray that the Lord blesses this Mission. If we pray daily for the next month that this mission will bring forth real spiritual fruit amongst us... it will. Every day pray an "extra" Our Father & Hail Mary, or which ever prayer you feel comfortable praying for the success of this project. It would be extra good if you could say these prayers with others, especially children. The prayers of children are powerful.
- 2. Let others know about this mission. Next week Fr. Bo will have invitations and posters that you can give out to your friends and families. If we do not invite others to pray and reflect with us then the event will not impact the world as much as it could. Trust me, Fr. Bo will invite people, but it is much more effective if we ALL invite others.
 - In particular I am asking that our parish's UCWLC invite the members of all the city's other UCWLC's and even CWL's from near by Roman Catholic parishes too.
 - And likewise, I would ask the men of the parish to invite other men. The Knights of Columbus will be involved by bringing the icon, and UCBC's (Ukr. Cath. Brotherhoods of Canada - equivalent to the UCWLC but for men) support these types of efforts, but they will not come in numbers unless we invite them!
 - Kids: you too have to invite your friends. Tell your teachers and classmates.



- 3. Let's work together with St. Nicholas Parish. This mission is not just for us, but it is being put together with our Melkite community too. Let's work WITH them in welcoming people to our joint project. Let's get to know each other and make a great team.
- 4. Let's be ready for super hospitality. After each night's mission we need to make all of our guests welcome. For this I ask that our coffee, tea and juice be set with joy. If people want to provide snacks that would be great too. Perhaps even lenten-type snack options too, since this mission is during the great fast after all.
- 5. Flowers! The icon of our Lady is beautiful by itself, but it would be extremely appropriate to decorate it with flowers. Yes, I am aware that during the Great Fast we often don't decorate our church's with flowers, but... this time let's honour our Mother's guidance and protection with an abundance of beautiful blossoms. These are for her, not for us. Now the reality is Fr. Bo is not a florist. If this job is left up to him... (shutter)... well... let's not leave it to him. Please volunteer. Perhaps you know a Catholic florist who would be willing to help or donate.
- 6. Add your ideas to the ideas already put forward. If you would like to make this event more spiritually beneficial, then please tell Fr. Bo your plans.

Teach Us to Pray Thursdays March 14 - April 25



Dormition Parish's Services are in RED. St. Nicholas Melkite's Services are in GREEN. Programs for All are in BLUE.

Kontakion: O Master, Guide to Wisdom*, Bestower of prudent counsel,* Instructor of the foolish and Defender of the poor ones;* make firm my heart and give it understanding.* Give me a word, O Word of the Father:* Behold, I shall not stop my lips from crying out to You:* In Your mercy, have mercy on me who am fallen.

Prokeimenon:

Pray and give praise to the Lord our God.* Pray and give praise to the Lord our God.

Verse: In Judea God is known; His name is great in Israel. (Psalm 75:12,2)

Epistle Romans 13:11-14:4

Brothers and Sisters: Besides this, you know what time it is, how it is now the moment for you to wake from sleep. For salvation is nearer to us now than when we became believers; the night is far gone, the day is near. Let us then lay aside the works of darkness and put on the armour of light; let us live honourably as in the day, not in reveling and drunkenness, not in debauchery and licentiousness, not in quarrelling and jealousy. Instead, put on the Lord Jesus Christ, and make no provision for the flesh, to gratify its desires.

Welcome those who are weak in faith, but not for the purpose of quarrelling over opinions. Some believe in eating anything, while the weak eat only vegetables. Those who eat must not despise

those who abstain, and those who abstain must not pass judgment on those who eat; for God has welcomed them. Who are you to pass judgment on servants of another? It is before their own lord that they stand or fall. And they will be upheld, for the Lord is able to make them stand.

Alleluia:

Verse: It is good to give praise to the Lord, and to sing to Your name, O Most High.

The Service of Forgiveness - The Solemn Beginning of the Great Fast

The first week of the Great Fast is called the 'CLEAN WEEK' since during this time the People of God purify themselves in a special way by the practice of strict fast and abstinence and through more intense prayer. The fall of Adam and Eve and their expulsion from Paradise are commemorated on the Sunday that Introduces the First Week of the Great Fast.

If the service is to follow the Divine Liturgy the "Usual Beginning" is omitted.

PRAYER OF ST. EPHREM

All: O Lord and Master of my life, keep from me the spirit of indifference and discouragement, lust of power

and idle chatter. (Prostration)

All: Instead, grant to me, Your servant, the spirit of wholeness of being humble mindedness, patience

and love. (Prostration)

All: O Lord and King, grant me the grace to be aware of my sins and not to judge my brother; for You are

blessed now and ever and forever. Amen.

(Prostration)

THE PRAYER OF FORGIVENESS

Priest: On bended knee, let us pray to the Lord. (Kneel)

People: Lord, have mercy.

Priest: O Lord, Jesus Christ, our God and hope of all on land

and of those far away at sea, you have established these holy days of fasting by Your law and the prophets, as a way for our mortification and repentance. At the proper time, You manifested Yourself in the flesh on this earth, and by Your fast of forty days and nights, You sanctified the practice of fasting and commanded us to follow Your example. As a merciful and gracious God, enable us to begin these holy days of the Great Fast with perfect repentance, with humility instead of hypocrisy, with fervent prayer, with hunger and thirst, with frequent prostrations, and with a contrite heart. Enable us also to complete this time of the Great Fast without fault and with a pure conscience, keeping our faith intact and achieving victory over sin. Send us an angel of peace to watch over our lives, to protect us from all snares of our enemies, and to assist us in the performance of good deeds. Strengthen us by Your power so that we may accomplish the spiritual works

of the Great Fast. Then, with our passions in control

and our souls and bodies properly cleansed, we will be worthy to partake, without condemnation, of Your most pure Body and Your most precious and lifegiving Blood. For You are the merciful and gracious Lover of Mankind Who come down to earth to save all; and we give glory to You and Your Eternal Father and Your all holy gracious, and life-giving Spirit, now and ever, and forever.

People: Amen.

DISMISSAL (Stand)

Priest: Glory be to You, 0 Christ, our God, our hope; glory be

to You.

People: Glory be to the Father, and to the Son and to the Holy

Spirit, now and ever and forever. Amen.

Lord, have mercy. Lord, have mercy. Lord, have mercy.

Give the blessing!

Priest: May Christ our true God, have mercy on us and save

us through the prayers of His most pure Mother, and of the glorious and illustrious Apostles and of our holy Father John Chrysostom Archbishop of

Constantinople and of all the saints, for He is gracious

and loves mankind.

People: Amen.

Then, prostrating before the assembled Body of Christ, the Priest begs from the Faithful their forgiveness, saying:

Priest: Holy brothers and sisters, forgive me, a sinner, and

pray for me.

People: God forgives May the Lord forgive you, Father, and

have mercy on you. Also forgive us Father, and pray

for us!

Priest: God forgives! May He have mercy on us and forgive

us all.

The people come forward and embrace the priest and receive the anointing with oil. The people then approach one another and mutually seek forgiveness.
