House Blessing Season is upon us!

The custom of the priest visiting parishioners' homes and businesses to bless them with the "Jordan Water" from Theophany has endured for hundreds of years.

The first few years of our lives, which are spent almost entirely in the home, are the most formative years of life. In a real sense, the home is a school. Things are constantly being taught there. Parents and others in the household teach by what they are and how they live every day. It is the most important of schools, because values, attitudes, a way of life are taught there all the time.

In a real sense, the home is also a church. Prayers are said there. God is worshipped there. Most homes have a Bible and prayer books. There is an altar in the home – the dining table. There we bless our daily food and eat it. This food becomes our body and blood-our tissues of life, constantly renewed and replaced.

There are people, Christians, in the home, just as in church. Most homes have a...

... cross and icons; many have candles. Most Christians pray at home, in the morning and in the evening. If they have sinned, they ask for God's forgiveness. Certainly religion is not something found only in church. It is found in the home, too.

This is why the Church brings the blessing of Theophany into the home. Just as the home is an extension of the church, this blessing of the home is an extension of the service of blessing that began in the church. So let our homes be Christian places. Let them show our faith, with icons and candles and prayers and Christian living. Above all, let them be places where the presence of Christ is felt day by day. Let them be places of light, of love, of refuge from the darkness of this world.

Some suggestions and info about my visit to bless your home:

- **To book your house blessing time, please fill out one of the slots on the schedule on the bulletin board.**
 - If possible "clump" your house blessing next to other people so that I don't have a lot of "dead time" between blessings.
 - If possible sign up for a time slot that is near someone else in your neighbourhood. This will save me some driving.
 - If you live far away from everyone book off some slots ahead and after your house blessing so that I can travel.
- I will call you when I am on my way (to make sure you are home and ready for me).
 - sometimes traffic, or other unforeseen events might make me late. Please be patient with me.
 - If things change for you you can always call to reschedule or even cancel. My number is 780-340-3726.
- When I arrive, have everyone in the home gather around the kitchen / dining table and join in the prayers.
- Please turn off your TVs, stereos, and computers.
- On your dining room table, if you have one, place a lighted candle and, if you have, an icon of Christ. (If you don't have one, don't worry, I will bring one with me)
- If you have any religious items such as bibles, icons or crosses that you would like to have blessed place them on the table too.
- Make a list of the first names of those family members you wish to pray for, with the living and the deceased in separate columns.
- Pets may be blessed, too! I love pets and am happy to have them run around, but if they will constantly bark, or if they may bite, then perhaps you should secure them.
- Don't fuss too much with details. My house is messy too. (all houses should look lived in)
- Typically it is the head of the household that leads the priest around the home with a lit candle, however children often like to do this job. It shows that they are important in the prayer life of the family.
- Have whomever is leading the procession, flip the light switches on as we bless the home so that I can see where I am going. I can switch them off again for you as we exit.
- House blessings are also a great opportunity for you to get to know your priest and vice-versa. If time permits, after the blessing, offer me a glass of water, tea or juice (I don't drink coffee) and let's get to know one another better.
- There is no "fee". Money is not why I go around to bless homes. I wish to get to know and pray with everyone. You do not have to give me an envelope.

Martyr Tatiana of Rome, and those who suffered with Her

The Holy Virgin Martyr Tatiana was born into an illustrious Roman family, and her father was elected consul three times. He was secretly a Christian and raised his daughter to be devoted to God and the Church. When she reached the age of maturity, Tatiana decided to remain a virgin, betrothing herself to Christ. Disdaining earthly riches, she sought instead the imperishable wealth of Heaven. She was made a deaconess in one of the Roman churches and served God in fasting and prayer, tending the sick and helping the needy.

When Rome was ruled by the sixteen-year-old Alexander Severus (222-235), all power was concentrated in the hands of the regent Ulpian, an evil enemy and persecutor of Christians. Christian blood flowed like water. Tatiana was also arrested, and they brought her into the temple of Apollo to force her to offer sacrifice to the idol. The saint began praying, and suddenly there was an earthquake. The idol was smashed into pieces, and part of the temple collapsed and fell down on the pagan priests and many pagans. The demon inhabiting the idol fled screeching from that place. Those present saw its shadow flying through the air.

Then they tore holy virgin's eyes out with hooks, but she bravely endured everything, praying for her tormentors that the Lord would open their spiritual eyes. And the Lord heard the prayer of His servant. The executioners saw four angels encircle the saint and beat her tormentors. A voice was heard from the heavens speaking to the holy virgin. Eight men believed in Christ and fell on their knees before Saint Tatiana, begging them to forgive them their sin against her. For confessing themselves Christians they were tortured and executed, receiving Baptism by blood.

The next day Saint Tatiana was brought before the wicked judge. Seeing her completely healed of all her wounds, they stripped her and beat her, and slashed her body with razors. A wondrous fragrance then filled the air. Then she was stretched out on the ground and beaten for so long that the servants had to be replaced several times. The torturers became exhausted and said that an invisible power was beating them with iron rods. Indeed, the angels warded off the blows directed at her and turned them upon the tormentors, causing nine of them to fall dead. They then threw the saint in prison, where she prayed all night and sang praises to the Lord with the angels.

A new morning began, and they took Saint Tatiana to the tribunal once more. The torturers beheld with astonishment that after such terrible torments she appeared completely healthy and even more radiant and beautiful than before. They began to urge her to offer sacrifice to the goddess Diana. The



saint seemed agreeable, and they took her to the heathen temple. Saint Tatiana made the Sign of the Cross and began to pray. Suddenly, there was a crash of deafening thunder, and lightning struck the idol, the sacrificial offerings and the pagan priests.

Once again, the martyr was fiercely tortured. She was hung up and scraped with iron claws, and her breasts were cut off. That night, angels appeared to her in prison and healed her wounds as before. On the following day, they took Saint Tatiana to the circus and loosed a hungry lion on her. The beast did not harm the saint, but meekly licked her feet.



As they were taking the lion back to its cage, it killed one of the torturers. They threw Tatiana into a fire, but the fire did not harm the martyr. The pagans, thinking that she was a sorceress, cut her hair to take away her magical powers, then locked her up in the temple of Zeus.

On the third day, pagan priests came to the temple intending to offer sacrifice to Zeus. They beheld the idol on the floor, shattered to pieces, and the holy martyr Tatiana joyously praising the Lord Jesus Christ. The judge then condemned the valiant sufferer to be beheaded with a sword. Her father was also executed with her, because he had raised her to love Christ.

Our First: “Community Soup Night”

We have been thinking about this for a long time, and now is the time to make some plans. Our neighbourhood has many people in it that are less fortunate. Many of them are homeless and hungry, and all of them are God-given gifts to us.

Christ commands his disciples when they see hungry people in the gospel about the loaves and fishes, to **“GO FEED THEM YOURSELVES”**. So here we are, a parish of Christ’s disciples, and we too see hungry people. Should we not also feed those hungry people we see?

The obvious answer is: Yes. We might not be able to fill everyone’s needs with what we have. Or can we? This is what the disciples thought too. But God took their effort and made it work. Over 5000 men were fed plus women and children!

As a parish we will be opening our doors for the first time to do a “Community Night”. This will include a shortened version of Vespers (like they do at the “Welcome Home” in Winnipeg) and a bowl of soup. Maybe a bun too. That is it. We will sit down at tables with strangers, whomever comes, and eat with them.

Will this go over well? Maybe yes, maybe not. Probably it will. It is a simple plan.

If 5 people come, good. If 50 come, wow, that’s very good. If 100 come... we will run out of soup and bowls (unless Jesus does His thing again), but, oh well, so be it. We will know to cook more soup next time.

The current plan is to have some young people from our parish and other parishes with their parents cook up a big pot or two of soup. Whatever people bring, that is what our soup will contain. (yes, we will do some pre-planning too) With the help of a few seminarians and whatever people come from our own and from our sister parishes, we will pray together, and eat together. Then we bid our new friends goodbye, lock up, fire up the dish washer and mop the floors.

Then we look at what went well and what we will need to change. Then we do it again. (when we are ready)

I plan to let people know about it by telling the staff at Our Lady of Peace School, and maybe putting it on the outdoor sign that we have (if I can find the key for it again).

5pm ...? 6 pm...? Which night should we do it on? Well, the plan is to do it at the end of this month. Wednesdays or Thursdays tend to work best for Fr. Bo, so... **let’s talk about it after Liturgy today** (at the Kutya).

(If it is Thursday: likely “Liturgical Singing with Namisha” will be either unaffected or slightly delayed.)

You might have the same Questions for this FAMILY DAY WEEKEND Icon Writing Retreat. I'd love to have you.

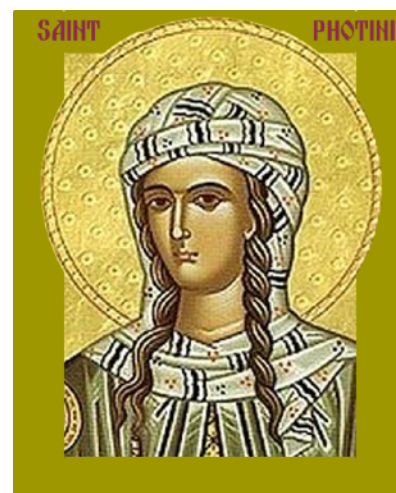
Dear "so-and-so",

There is indeed room for you if you wish to join us. We'd love to have you.

You can register at the following website (Eventbrite) or by visiting our Ukr. Cath. Pastoral Centre (which will save you the EventBrite fees). <https://www.eventbrite.ca/e/icon-workshop-tickets-86772443715>

If you register online it will ask you a few questions. If you want to do it in person then I need to know your Name, Email, Mobile Phone, Gender, Experience: ☐ Beginner (0-5 icons), ☐ Some Experience (5-10), ☐ Intermediate (11-50), or ☐ Advanced (50+ icons), Any medical or dietary info that we should know about, an Emergency Contact, and their phone

If you have limited experience then you will likely be painting something like the simpler image (above). For those with Intermediate or advanced experience you will get to paint the whole scene with Christ, St. Photini, the well, the city, etc... (left)



Ummm... what else can I tell you? I anticipate using every minute of our time as effectively as we can, however we will leave a little time for walking around and reflection in "God's Playground". We will pray together in the morning and evening, and we will eat simple food that we will throw into the oven ourselves (or stir up on the stove) (...a cook would raise the price for us...). Beds are comfortable, but you will need to bring your own bedding / blankets. Most likely we will all have our own rooms.

The price is \$650, this includes all supplies, food and lodging.

I will be out at the camp early on Friday (noon-ish) and I would encourage everyone to arrive as they are able. Once everyone is there, we will begin (I am picturing about 6-6:30). The retreat/workshop will continue till we are done on Monday. Likely this will be in the afternoon, perhaps as late as supper.... It depends on all of you.

But each of us was given grace according to the measure of Christ's gift. Therefore it is said, "When he ascended on high he made captivity itself a captive; he gave gifts to his people." (When it says, "He ascended," what does it mean but that he had also descended into the lower parts of the earth? He who descended is the same one who ascended far above all the heavens, so that he might fill all things.) The gifts he gave were that some would be apostles, some prophets, some evangelists, some pastors and teachers, to equip the saints for the work of ministry, for building up the body of Christ, until all of us come to the unity of the faith and of the knowledge of the Son of God, to maturity, to the measure of the full stature of Christ.

From that time Jesus began to proclaim, "Repent, for the kingdom of heaven has come near."

Hymn to the Mother of God and the Irmos:

Every tongue is at a loss to praise you as is your due, O Mother of God. Even a spirit from above is filled with dizziness when seeking to sing your praises. But since you are good accept our faith, for you know well our love inspired by God. For it is you who protect all Christians; therefore, we magnify you.

Communion Hymn:

Instead of "May our mouths..." and "Blessed be the Name..." we sing:

All creation is filled with rejoicing today, for Christ is baptized in the Jordan. **(3x)**
